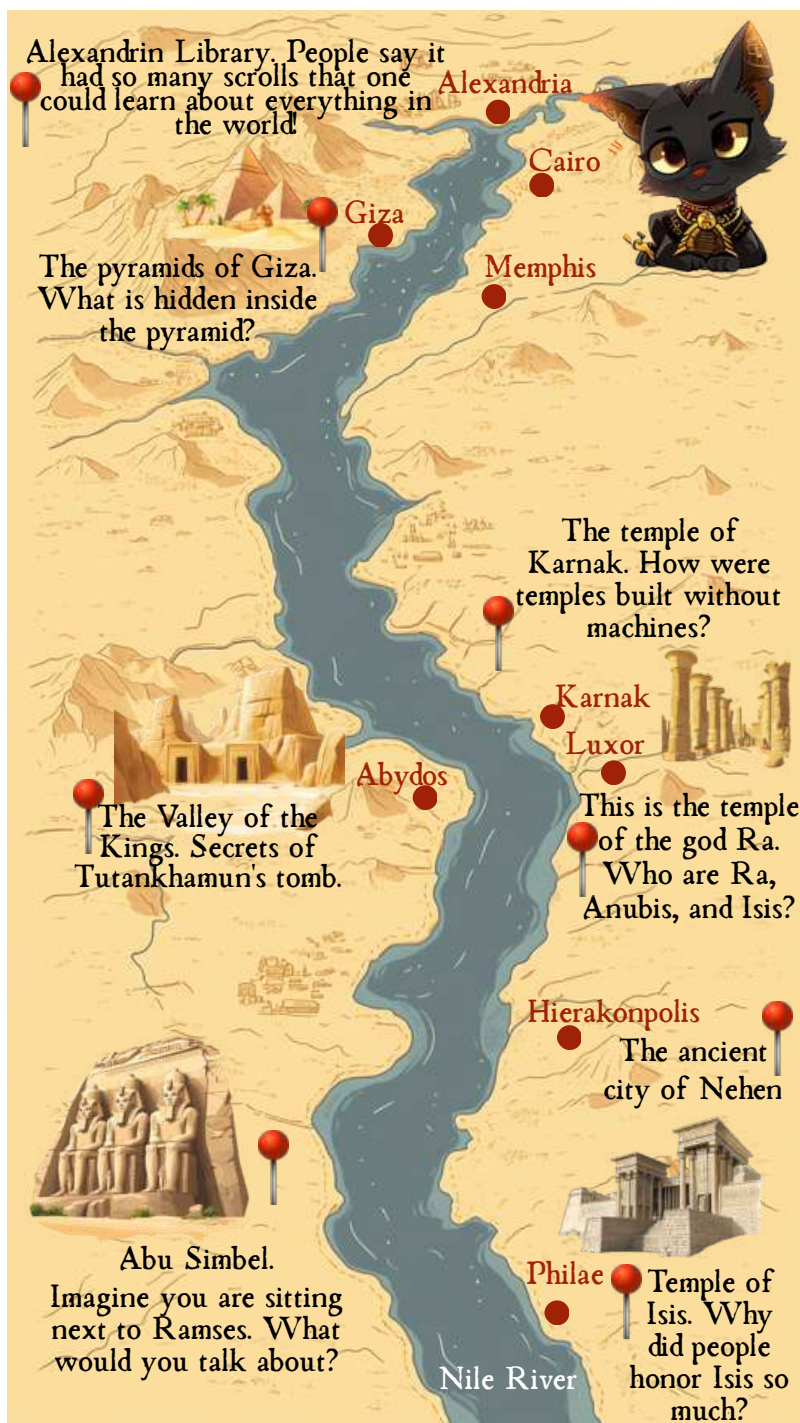

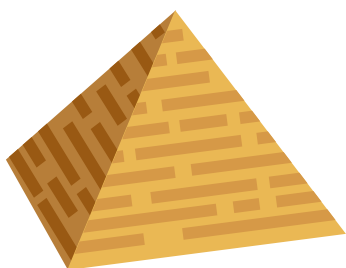

The Nile River and its importance in ancient Egypt

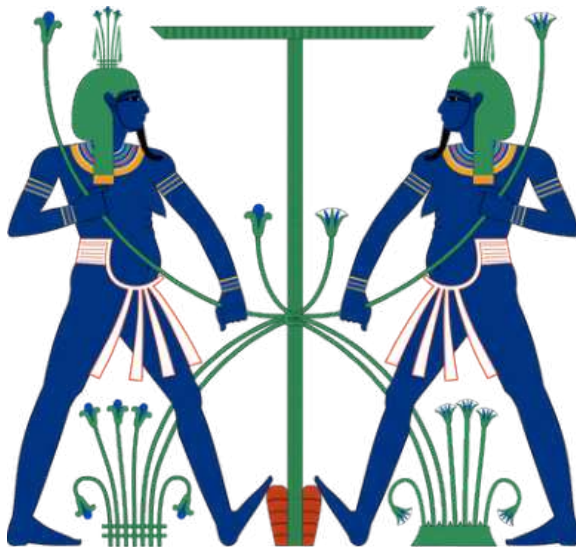
The Nile River is one of the longest rivers in the world. It flows through many countries, but it was especially important to ancient Egypt.

What was the Nile for the Egyptians? It was the most important road in the country. Every year, when the river flooded, its waters brought rich black silt soils that made the land very fertile. The Egyptians called this the "gift of the Nile." This gift allowed people to grow wheat, barley, legumes, fruits, and vegetables. This gave them food and the opportunity to trade with other countries.

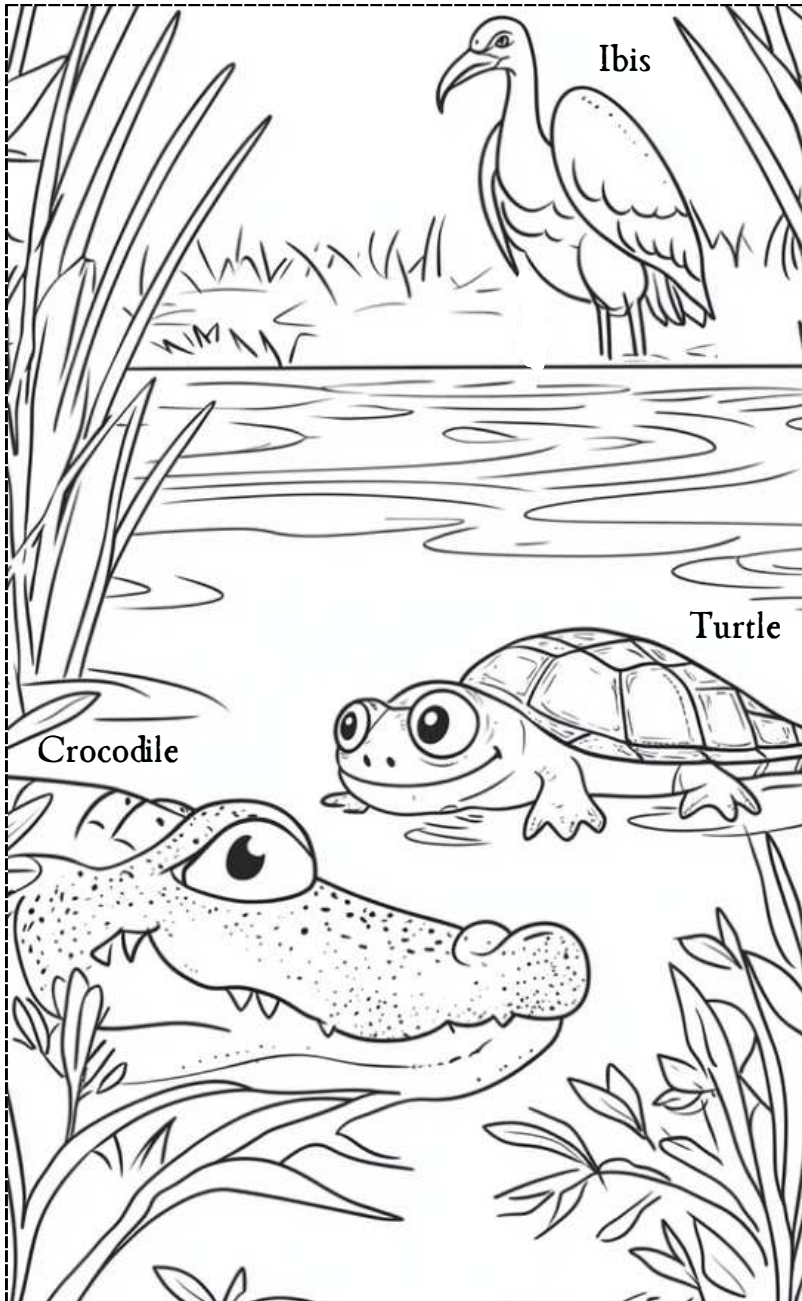


The Nile was important for more than just feeding people. It was also important for transportation. Boats on the river helped transport goods, people, and building materials to create the pyramids and temples. The Egyptian gods also believed in the power of the river. They thought the Nile was a gift from the gods. They believed that the river's water helped them live and prosper.

The Nile was also important for religion. The Egyptians worshiped the god of the Nile, Hapi. He was a very big man who brought lots of water and made the land fertile. The gods and goddesses of Ancient Egypt were also closely connected with the Nile River because life in Egypt was impossible without it.

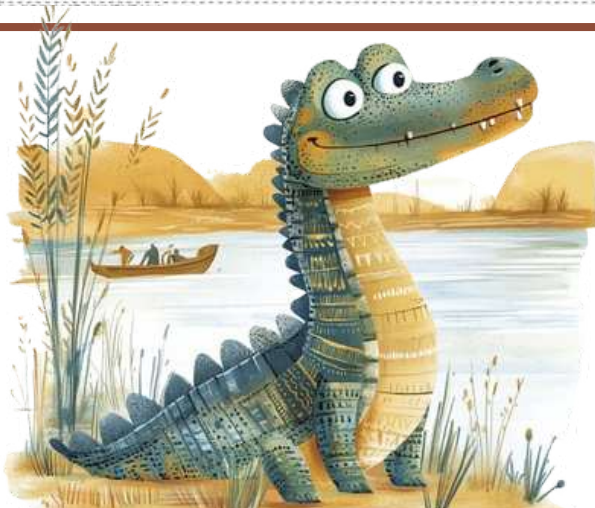

These were drawings that were used to write messages instead of letters.

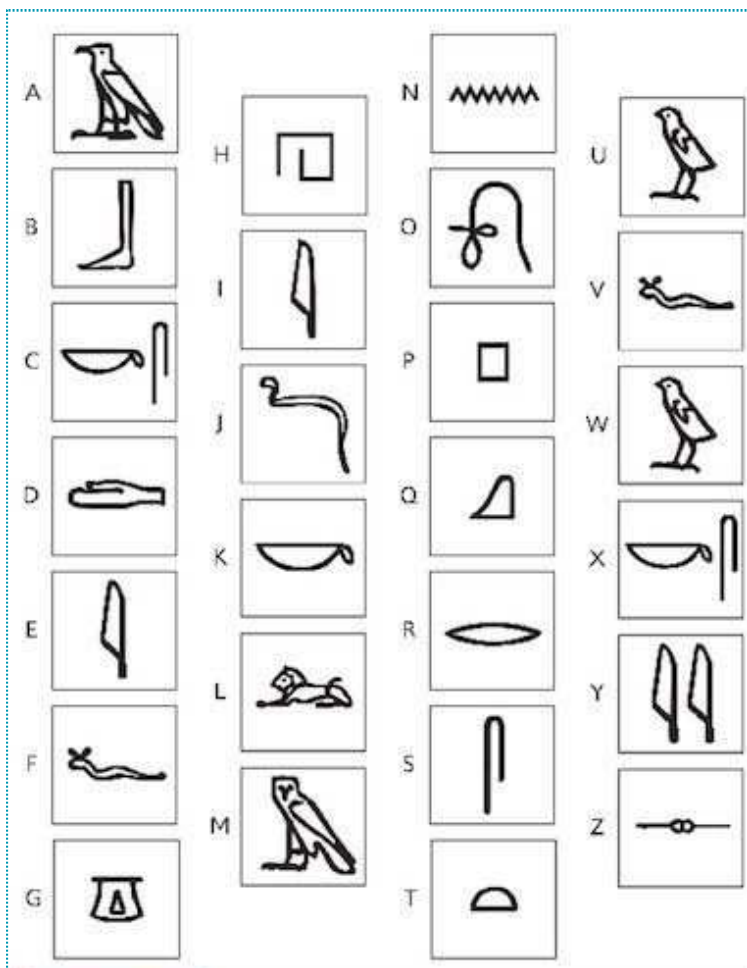
Each sign is either a sound or a whole word!

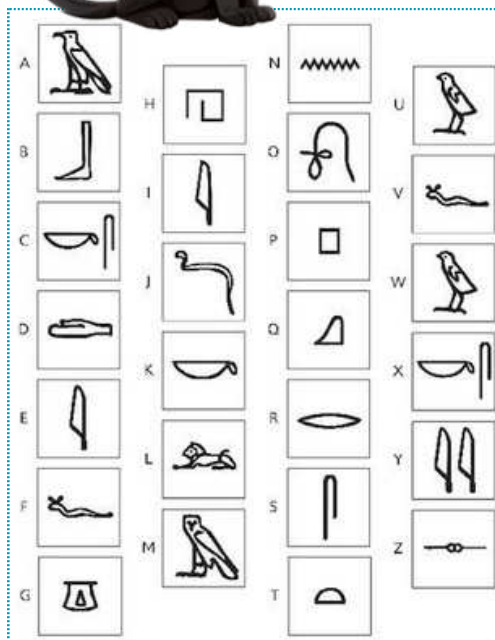
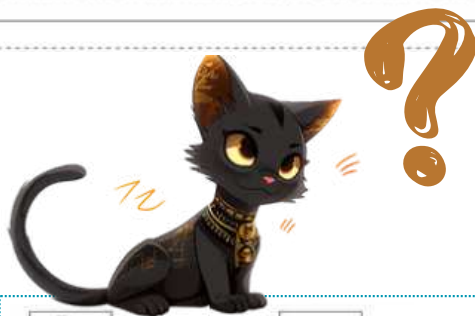

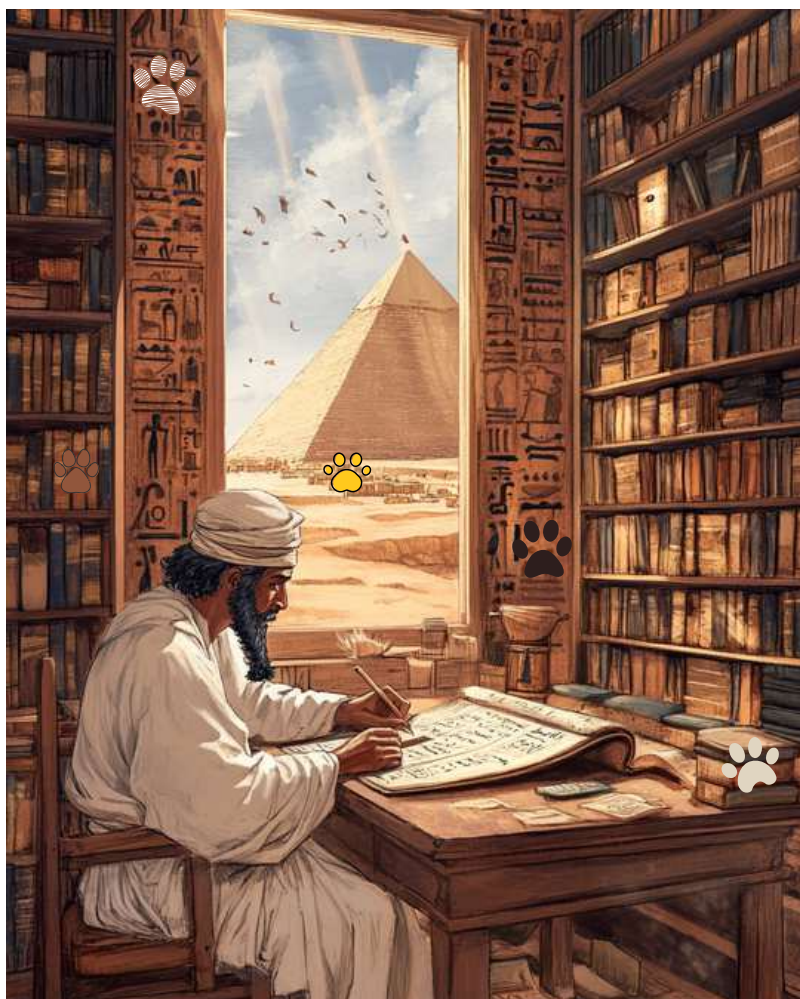

Papyrus is a special kind of paper made from a plant that grew near the Nile River. The Egyptians used papyrus to write hieroglyphs and draw pictures.

4. THE GREAT PHARAOHS

Who are the pharaohs?

A long time ago, there were special rulers in a faraway country called Egypt. These rulers were called pharaohs.

A pharaoh is like a king or queen, but the pharaoh is from Egypt. They ruled the whole country, built pyramids, ordered temples to be built, and protected their people. Pharaohs were seen as more than just people; they were considered sons of the sun. In ancient Egypt, they believed that the sun god Ra chose the pharaoh. That is why everyone worshiped him.

Pharaoh wore special clothes. He wore white linen clothes, a lot of jewelry, and a crown or nemes (a striped cloth headdress) on his head. The pharaoh always held two symbols of power in his hands: a rod and a whip.



Pharaohs loved cats. They thought of them as sacred animals. If Lilou the cat were in Ancient Egypt, she would definitely be loved! Pharaohs didn't actually live in pyramids. They built them as tombs. They were huge stone tombs.

The most famous pharaoh that people often mention is Tutankhamun. He became pharaoh when he was almost a child—only 9 years old!

Pharaohs were strong, wise, and a little mysterious. Thanks to them, temples, statues, and scrolls with hieroglyphs—as well as the legendary pyramids—appeared in Egypt!

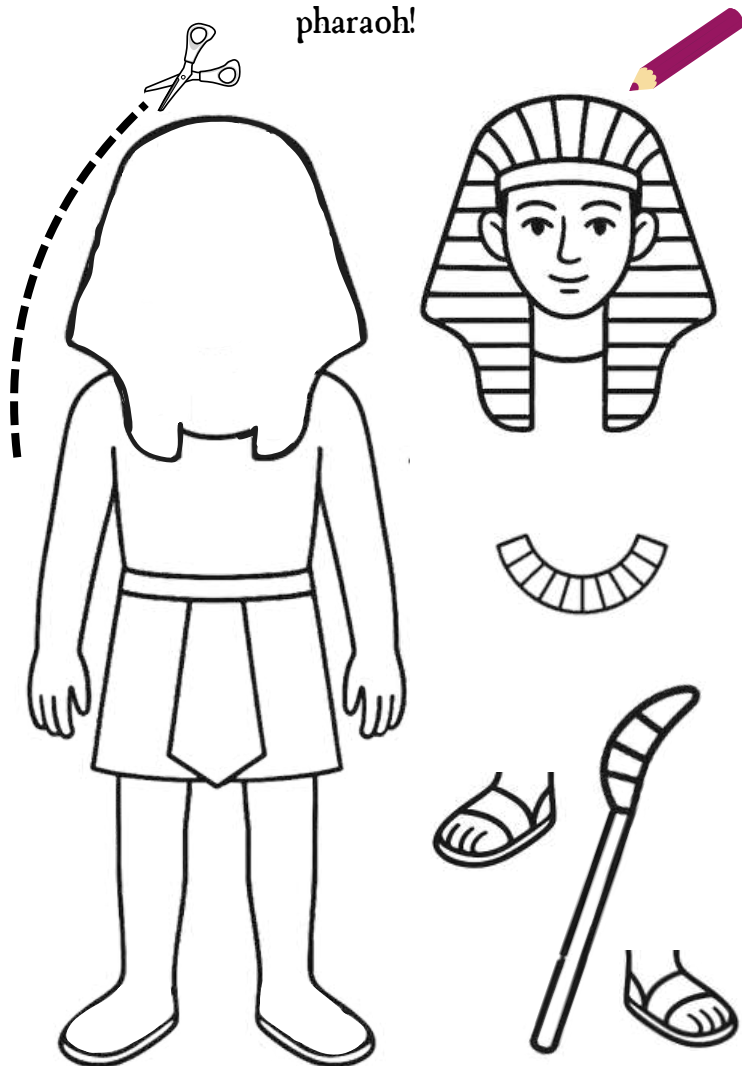

Lilu moved on and saw a big room where a cat in a golden crown was sitting! 🐱 He looked at her with wise eyes and purred

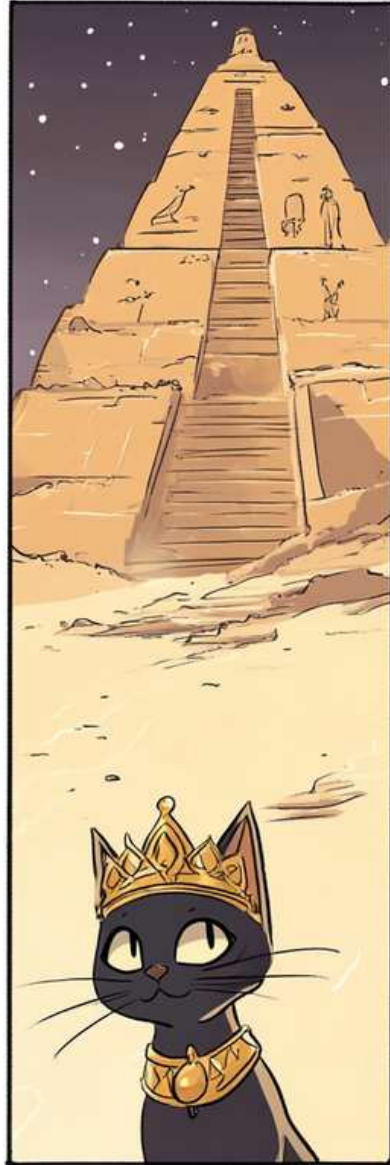

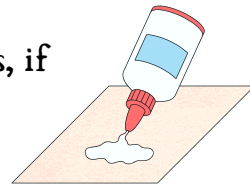


Here's how to make a paper pyramid

Today, we're going to make a paper pyramid, just like real archaeologists did in ancient Egypt! It's interesting and easy! So, let's get started!

You will need:

- Pyramid template (with a square base and 4 triangles)
- Scissors
- Glue or double-sided tape
- Pencil (for drawing fold lines, if needed)
- Ruler (for accuracy)



Here are the step-by-step instructions:

1. Cut out the template.

Take the pyramid template and carefully cut out all the parts. You should have one large square (the base of the pyramid) and four triangles (the sides of the pyramid).

2. Prepare the flaps for gluing.

Each triangle has a small flap on one side. This will help us stick the sides of the pyramid together.

Use a ruler and a pencil to draw the fold lines on these flaps. Remember that you will need to bend them!

3. Bend the flaps.

Now gently bend the flaps on the triangles. This will make it easier to glue them to the bottom of the pyramid.

4. Glue the sides of the pyramid together. Begin by gluing one of the triangles to the square base. Don't forget the flap! Glue it to one side of the square.

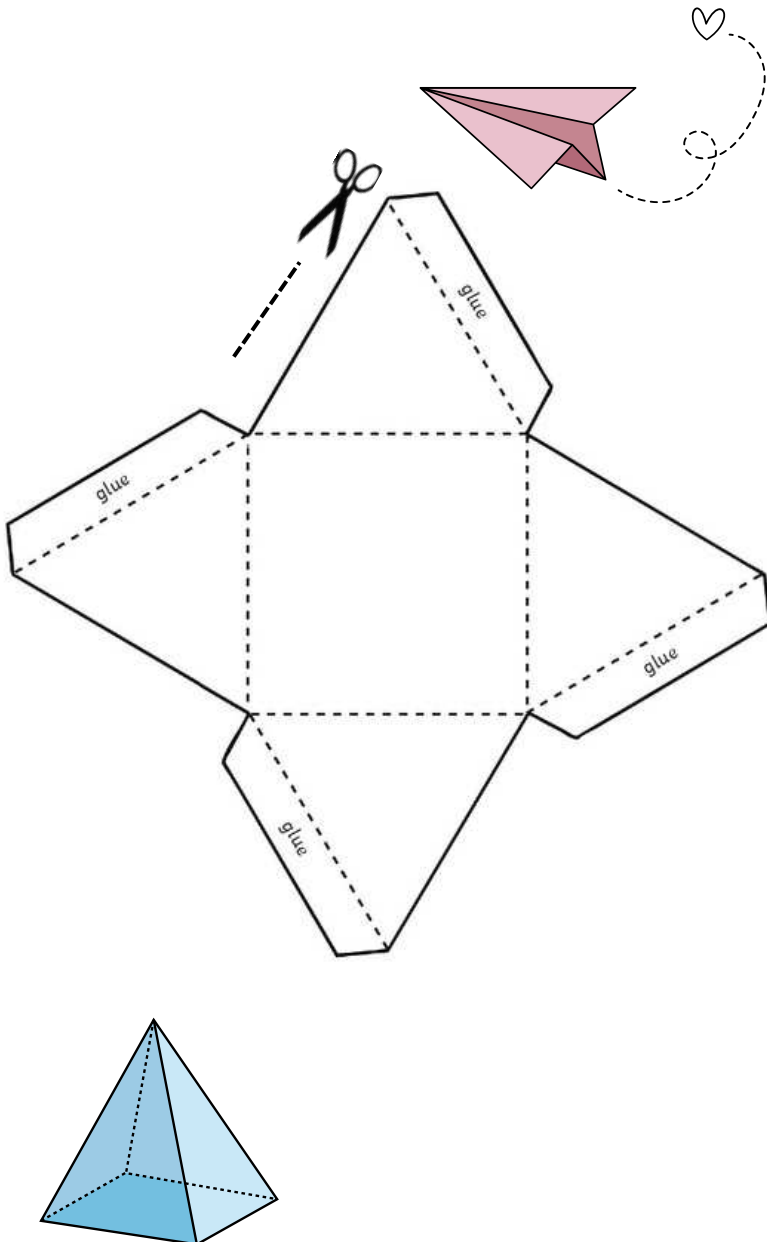
Then take the second triangle, glue it to the base again, and glue the flap to the adjacent side. Repeat this step with the other triangles.

5. Finish the pyramid by gluing the last triangle to the top edge of the base. The pyramid will start to take shape!

When all the triangles are in place, you will have a beautiful pyramid! You can press on the glued parts to make sure they stick well.

6. Finish:

Let the glue dry and let the pyramid stay stable.

A mummy is a human or animal body that has been preserved after being treated in a special way. The ancient Egyptians made mummies to keep the bodies of the dead alive after death.

6. EGYPTIAN GODS AND MYTHS

In Ancient Egypt, people believed in many gods, and each god had its own special power and responsibility. They thought that the gods helped to maintain order in the world and that all the events that occurred were the result of the gods' actions.

The main gods of Egypt:

Ra - the sun god Ra was one of the most important gods. He was the personification of the sun, which gives light and life. Every day, Ra traveled across the sky in his magnificent chariot, and at night he traveled through the dark world of the underworld to reappear the next morning.



Isis is the goddess of magic and motherhood. Isis was very wise and helped people. She was the wife of Osiris and loved her son Horus very much. Isis was often depicted with a crown in the form of a throne on her head, symbolizing her power as a goddess of power.



Osiris is the god of life and death. Osiris was the god of fertility and became the ruler of the realm of the dead. His brother, Seth, was jealous of him and took his life, but Isis brought Osiris back to life so that he could rule in the afterlife.



Horus is the god of the sky and the protector of the kingdom. Horus was the son of Isis and Osiris. He was often depicted with the head of a falcon, and his duty was to protect the pharaoh and all of Egypt from enemies.



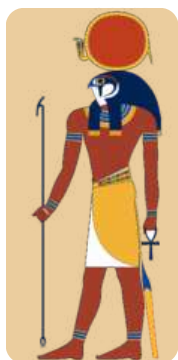
Anubis is the god of burial and mummification. Anubis was a god who helped the dead enter the realm of the dead. He was depicted as a man with a jackal's head because jackals often roamed near tombs.



Thoth - he is the god of wisdom and writing. Thoth was the god of writing and science. He helped the gods keep records and maintain order in the universe. He was often shown with the head of an ibis (bird), which was a symbol of wisdom.

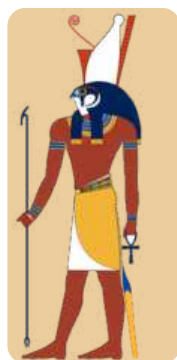

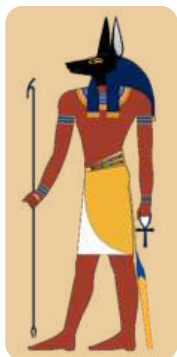

The Sphinx is a statue of a lion that guards the pyramids in the hot Egyptian desert.

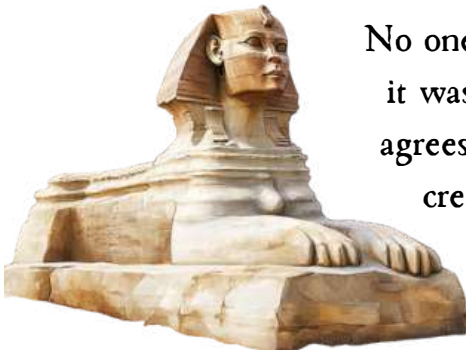

The Sphinx is in Egypt, near the city of Giza, on the plateau, next to the great pyramids, especially the pyramid of Pharaoh Chephren.

The Old Sphinx

The Sphinx is very old. It is over 4,500 years old! It was built around 2550 BC on the orders of Pharaoh Chephren. No one knows exactly when it was built, but everyone agrees that the Sphinx was created to protect the pharaoh's tomb.



The Lost Nose

The Sphinx was once very beautiful. It had a large nose, but you can't see that now. Why? There are several different versions. Some people think that it was damaged in the Middle Ages when people tried to destroy ancient statues. Others say that the nose just collapsed over time. No matter what, the Sphinx is still standing, even without a nose, and guarding the land of Egypt.

The story of the Sphinx and its riddles became very popular thanks to ancient legends. The most famous of these legends is the story of Oedipus.

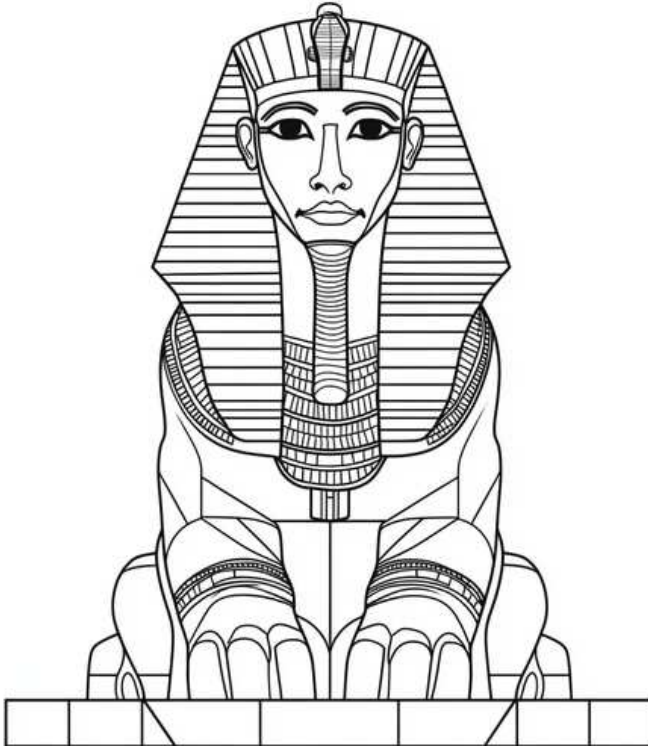


The Color of the Sphinx

8. YOUR OWN SCROL

What is papyrus?

A long time ago, when there were no notebooks or books, people in Egypt wrote on a plant! It was called papyrus.

Papyrus grew near the Nile River. It was tall, green, and similar to a reed. The Egyptians cut the stems into strips, soaked them in water, and then laid them out crosswise and pressed them together. This way, they made strong sheets. You can write on them with a brush or an ink stick!

What was papyrus used for?

 Important documents, letters, and even fairy tales were written on papyrus.

Sometimes it was rolled up and put into scrolls. These were long sheets that were kept in temples.

 Even priests wrote magic spells on papyrus!



😲 Interesting facts:

One scroll of papyrus could be longer than a giraffe!

Papyrus is the ancestor of modern paper.

The Egyptians valued it so much that they sold it to other countries.

Do you want to make your own papyrus and write a story on it? 🐾 Lilu is ready to show you how!





The process of making papyrus was as follows

1. They cut the stems of reeds:

The Egyptians cut papyrus stalks that could reach heights of up to 16 feet.



2. They cut them into strips:

The stems were cut into thin strips.



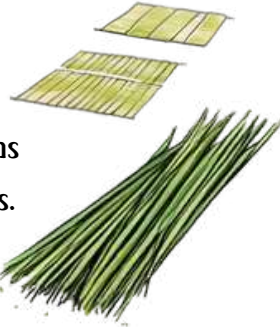
3. Soaked in water: The strips were soaked in water to make them softer.



4. Spread on a stone: The strips were then placed on a flat surface (usually a stone or a special press) and pressed together.



5. Drying: Then, the paper was dried in the sun.



Papyrus was made from the stems of reeds, not the reeds themselves. This made for a strong and flexible writing material.

If you can find a papyrus plant that grows near water, you and your parents can try to make real papyrus, just like in ancient Egypt. You could also try replacing it with strips of ordinary paper.

Error: The Egyptian cat in the image is holding a smartphone. Cell phones did not exist in ancient Egypt, so this element is not accurate.

4. Sculptures of Gods with Headphones

Error: Statues of Egyptian gods have headphones, which is a modern element. In ancient Egypt, the gods were depicted in traditional images, without headphones, which appeared only in our time.

5. Egyptian priests in shorts and T-shirts

Error: Egyptian priests are dressed in modern clothes - shorts and T-shirts - instead of traditional Egyptian garb. In ancient Egypt, priests wore special robes, often made of white cloth.

6. An Egyptian longboat with sails like a modern boat.

Error: The Egyptian barkas (boat) has been replaced by a modern boat with sails. In ancient Egypt, boats looked very different and did not have these modern elements.

7. Anubis with a baseball cap

Error: The god Anubis is wearing a baseball cap, which is a modern element that has nothing to do with ancient Egyptian deities. Anubis was depicted with a traditional headdress.

8. Egyptian stallion on roller skates

Error: The stallion wears roller skates instead of traditional hooves. This is a modern element that was never used in ancient Egypt.

These mistakes should make children realize the difference between ancient Egyptian cultural elements and modern items. The challenge is to find these "incompatible" details and realize that things were different in history!

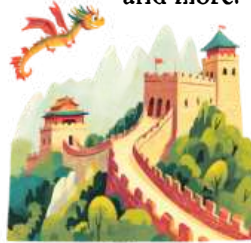
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
